Number of people displaced in South East since Feb 2021 and remain displaced

WEEKLY HIGHLIGHTS

In the South-East, the total number of IDPs increased significantly, with 17,500 newly displaced people (for a total 397,300 IDPs).

In Bago Region (East), 14,591 IDPs were displaced within Kyaukkyi, Nyaunglebin, Shwegyin, and Phyu Townships due to troop reinforcement and indiscriminate shelling on 11 and 28 February; among them, 1,437 IDPs were secondarily displaced in Kyaukkyi and Taungoo Townships.

In Kayah State, 738 IDPs were displaced within Demoso, Hpruso, and Loikaw Townships due to armed conflict and indiscriminate shelling on 23 and 24 January; among them, 662 IDPs were secondarily displaced in Demoso and Loikaw Townships. In Kayin State, 33 IDPs from Hpapun and Kawkareik Townships were displaced due to clashes on 11 and 28 February; among them, 25 IDPs were secondarily displaced in Kawkareik Township.

In Shan State (South), 2,804 IDPs were displaced from the border areas between Pekon and Pinlaung Townships due to fighting on 24 and 26 February.

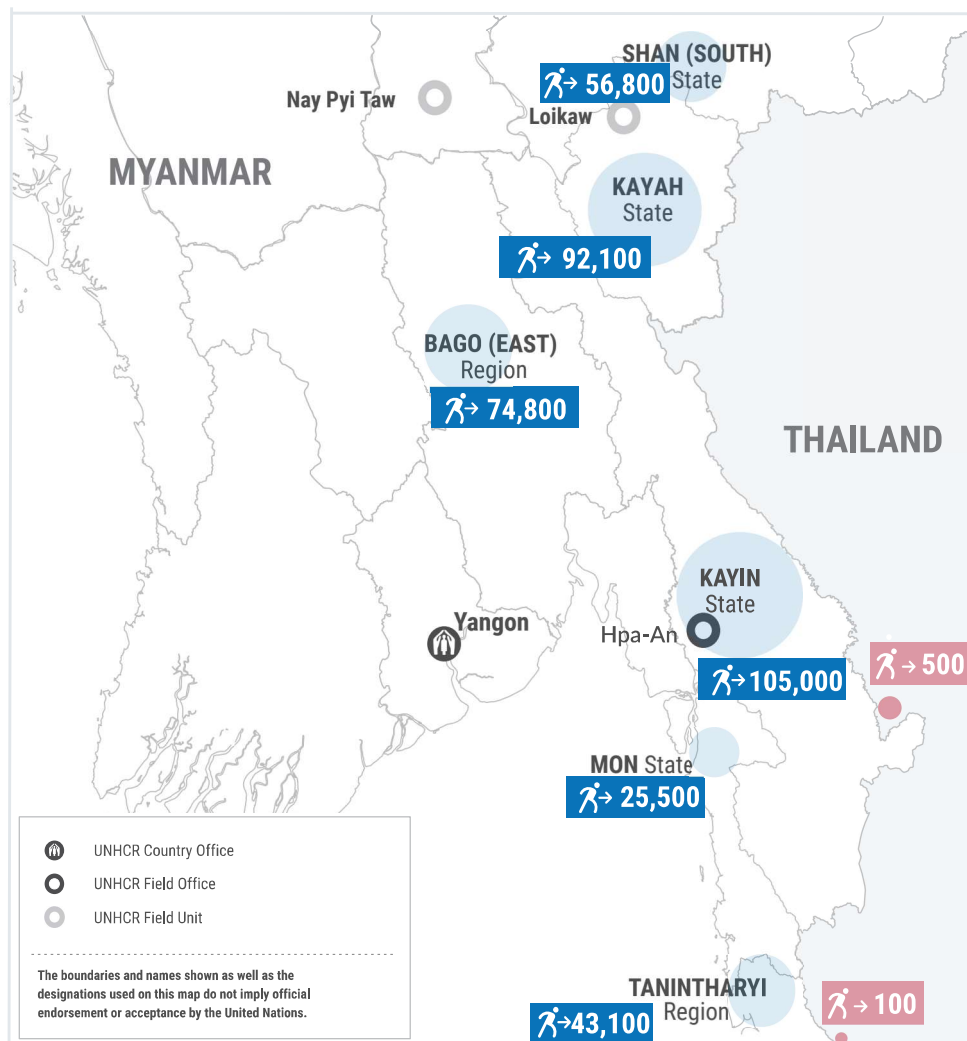
In Tanintharyi Region, 2,150 IDPs from Palaw Township were displaced within the same Township; among them, 150 IDPs were secondarily displaced.

In addition, 595 people were displaced to Thailand, among whom 495 were displaced to Tak and 100 to Ranong. Separately, 600 IDPs recently returned to their places of origin in February.

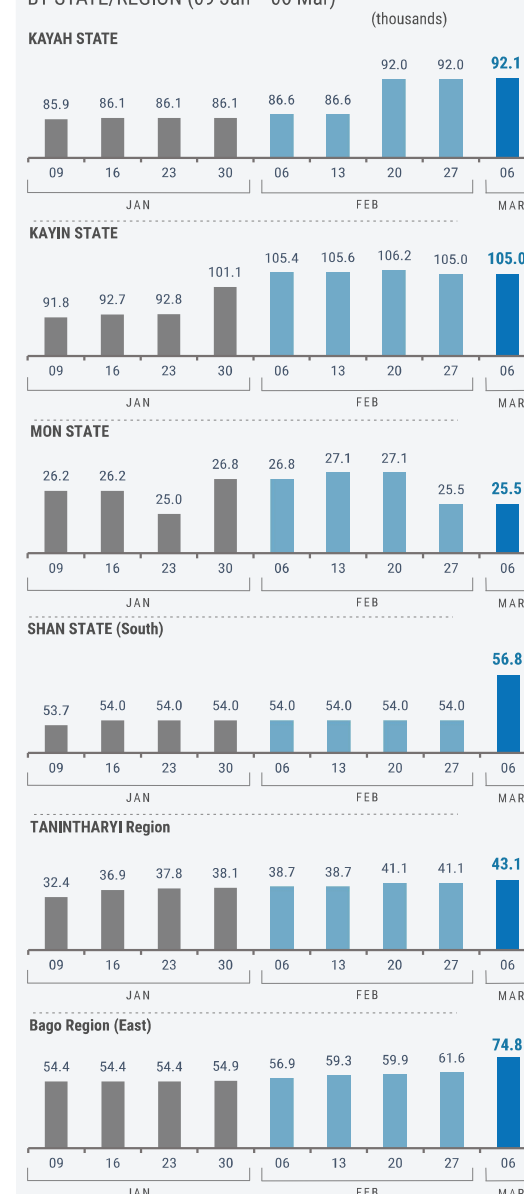

WEEKLY DISPLACEMENT FIGURES⁽²⁾

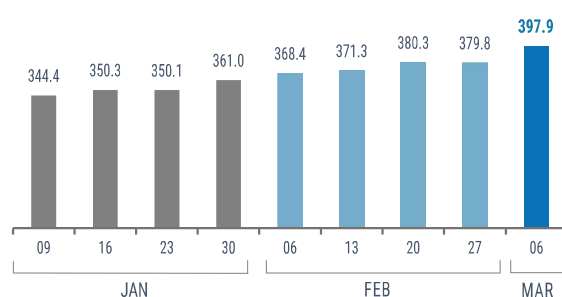
BY STATE/REGION (09 Jan - 06 Mar)
