Since the escalation of hostilities on 2 March 2026, and until 30 June, the Syrian General Authority for Border and Customs (GABC) estimates that **581,409 Syrians crossed from Lebanon into Syria**, while the Lebanese General Security (GSO) estimates that 491,265 Syrians departed through Official Crossing Points (OCPs) between 2 March and 26 June. While some movements to Syria were driven by the conflict in Lebanon, others reflect previously planned movements. Syrians crossing include people known, and not known to UNHCR, namely both refugees and Syrians who have stayed in Lebanon under various visa and sponsorship arrangements or returning from temporary visits. During June, a slight increase was observed in daily movement to Syria, with over **4,500 Syrians crossing per day** through OCPs, mainly due to the end of the school academic year and the start of the summer season. As of the end of June 2026, only **6% (29,054 individuals)** of Syrians who left Lebanon through the OCPs, based on GSO and UNHCR Syria data*, have so far been verified to be known to UNHCR**. Further verification, data collection and triangulation are ongoing.

Since March 2026, UNHCR has undertaken **69 missions to OCPs**, and conducted interviews with **a sample of 782 Syrians** both known (51%) and not known (49%) to UNHCR, as they were departing to Syria; 53% were conducted with adult men and 47% with adult women. Most Syrians (96%) were between 18 and 59 years old. Some Syrian families (48%) were observed travelling in complete male-headed households, while 30% were single adult males. Furthermore, while 55% of Syrians interviewed in March indicated they were leaving Lebanon **due to the security situation**, this figure dropped to **only 6% citing the security situation** as their **main motivation in June**. The majority (32%) in June indicated they were leaving for family reasons or to visit family in Syria, highlighting that movements to Syria are **no longer primarily driven by the security situation in Lebanon**. Among the Syrians interviewed, 19% indicated an intention to return to Damascus, 15% to (Rural) Damascus, 13% to Aleppo and 14% to Homs. These findings are based on a random sample and are not representative of the profiles and intentions of all returning Syrians, including those known to UNHCR.

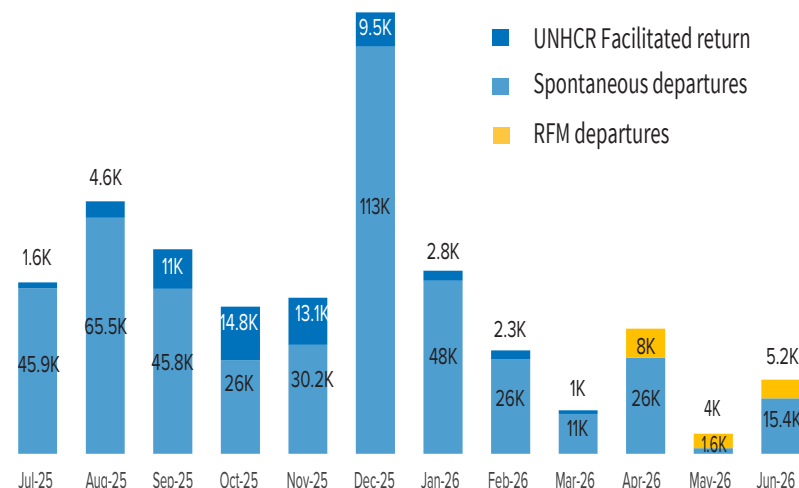

Since January 2025, **655,732 Syrians known to UNHCR have been confirmed or presumed to have returned to Syria**, and consequently inactivated from UNHCR's records. Among these, **88% (577,604 Syrians) spontaneously returned to Syria** – including 11% (65,500) who returned under duress in late 2024 and remained in Syria; 19% (112,372) who were identified by GSO when passing through OCPs without Repatriation Forms; and 5% (29,054) so far identified by GSO as having returned due to force majeure after 2 March 2026. Among the 655,732 Syrians who returned, **12% (78,128 individuals) were facilitated to return by UNHCR** – 60,836 under the voluntary return programme and 17,292 under the return due to force majeure programme since 1 April 2026. On 17 June 2026, UNHCR and IOM implemented the **first organized voluntary return movement since the hostilities**, with 30 individuals supported with transportation to return to Syria through Masnaa border crossing points. Spontaneous departure figures reflected in the chart indicate the date of inactivation from UNHCR's database and not the date of departure, accounting for the large number of inactivation in December 2025 due to the completion of the presence verification

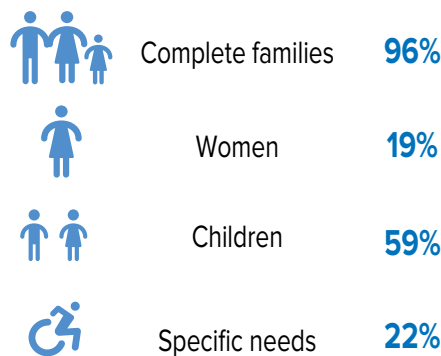


UNHCR-facilitated: Return due to force majeure

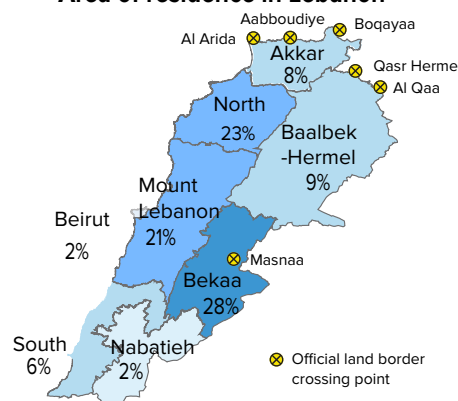
In response to the escalation of hostilities in Lebanon, UNHCR launched the return due to force majeure programme on 1 April 2026, based on a humanitarian imperative to alleviate harm and support refugees who were left with no viable alternative other than to return to Syria. While returns in those adverse conditions of hostilities in Lebanon were not considered voluntary, UNHCR provided this support as a harm-reduction measure, aiming to assist and support with transportation, food and other essential items during return to Syria in volatile circumstances. The cases of returning households were shared with UNHCR in Syria for follow-up and assistance inside Syria. By the end of June, **over 25,300 individuals (5,635 families) had contacted UNHCR and provided with counselling on RFM** and information on services available in Syria. Among the Syrians counselled, **17,292 individuals (3,899 families)** made the decision to return to Syria and were provided with a USD 100 cash grant per returning individual. Note: As of 1 July 2026, UNHCR has resumed voluntary return procedures and ceased the RFM programme.

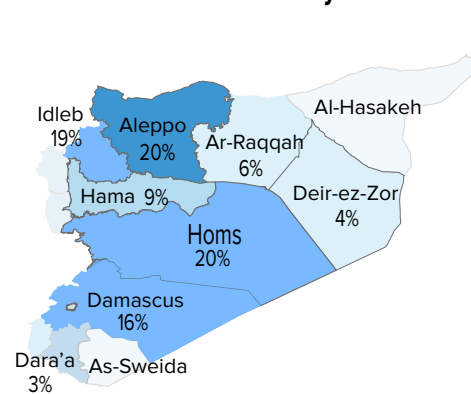
UNHCR - Facilitated Return: RFM



Area of residence in Lebanon

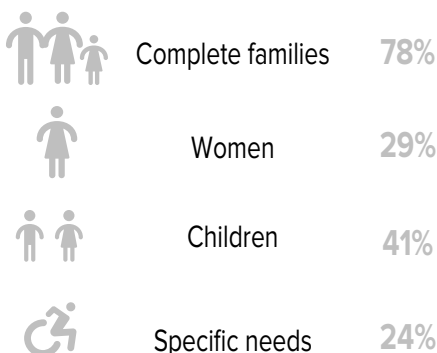


Intended area of return in Syria

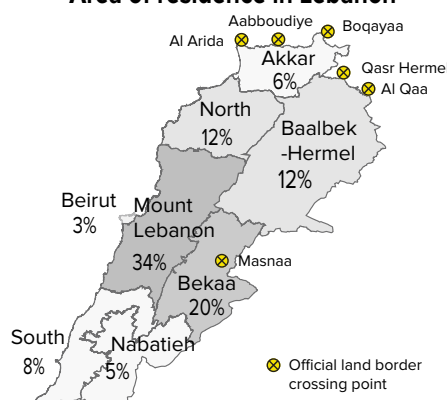


Among the 17,292 individuals assisted under the RFM programme, 38% resided in Bekaa, Baalbek and Hermel, 31% in North and Akkar, 23% in Beirut and Mt. Lebanon, and 8% in South and Nabatieh. **Refugees internally displaced prior to return to Syria reduced to only 6% in June**, compared to 15% in May, further indicating that hostilities now have a lesser impact on return decision-making. Only **72% of the households indicated that they planned to return to their areas of origin in Syria**, compared to 84% of households who previously returned under the voluntary return programme, suggesting an urgency to return due to the ongoing conflict. Among the RFM, 20% indicated planned return to Aleppo, 20% to Homs, 19% to Idleb, and 13% to Rural Damascus. 19% of those assisted with RFM were women and 59% were children, making **78% of returnees women and children**. 22% of those who were assisted to return due to force majeure have a protection need, notably 11% with a serious medical condition and 4% having a disability. Importantly, **96% returned in complete families** – substantially higher than the 85% who returned in complete families under the voluntary return programme. Of the adults who returned due to force majeure, **72% cited poor living conditions in Lebanon** while **14% cited the insecurity and conflict in Lebanon** (down from 28% in May) as the main drivers for their return.

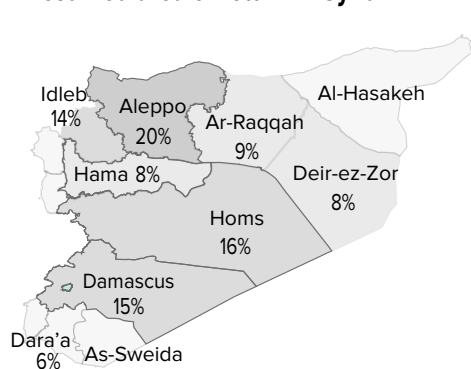
Spontaneous Departure

Among the 577,604 Syrian individuals who spontaneously returned, **fewer families (78%) returned in complete families** compared to the 85% returning in complete families of those facilitated with VolRep and 96% returning in complete families of those facilitated with RFM. Prior to spontaneous return, 37% resided in Beirut and Mount Lebanon, 32% in Bekaa, Baalbek and Hermel, 18% in North and Akkar, and 13% in South and Nabatieh. Those who returned spontaneously are presumed to have returned to their areas of origin – 20% to Aleppo, 16% to Homs, 14% to Damascus and Rural Damascus and 14% to Idleb. Furthermore, 29% of those who returned spontaneously are women and 41% are children – **70% of spontaneous returnees being women and children**. 24% of individuals who returned spontaneously have identified specific protection needs.
