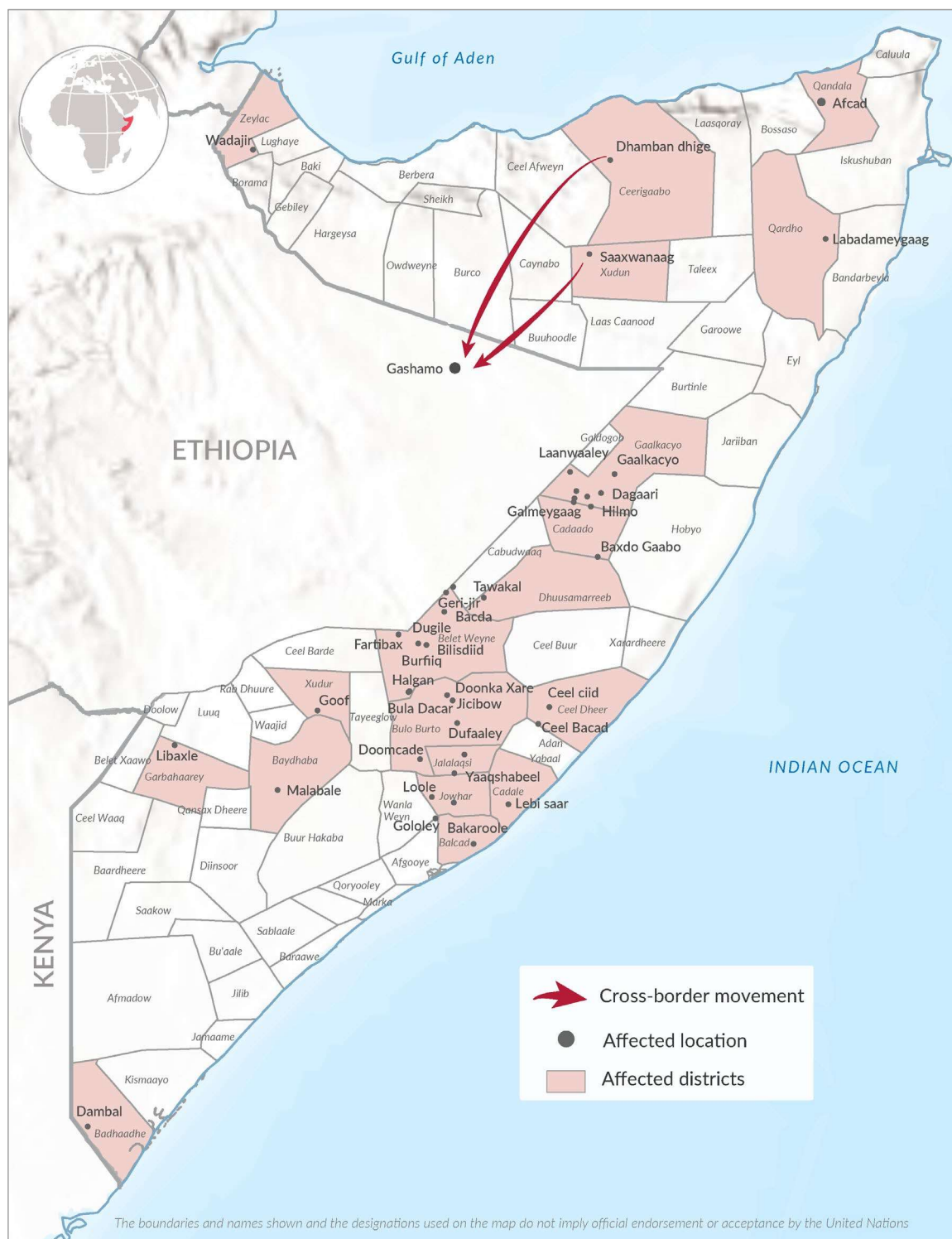

Background

Somalia's prolonged drought has escalated into a nationally declared emergency, significantly increasing humanitarian needs and pushing agro-pastoral communities into crisis. As water sources dry up, households are travelling long distances to access often unsafe water, worsening health conditions, food insecurity, and displacement risks. Humanitarian conditions are rapidly deteriorating in Lower Jubaland, Hiraan, Middle Shabelle, Mudug, Togdheer regions, and Sanaag, where many families are living in makeshift shelters or without adequate shelter, exposing them to harsh weather and protection risks. Women, children, older persons, and persons with disabilities are particularly vulnerable to violence, exploitation, and other protection concerns. Food insecurity and malnutrition remain severe, with many households eating once a day or less and livelihoods collapsing due to widespread livestock losses. The drought is severely affecting districts including Afmadow; Adale, Cadale, Buloburte, Matabaan, Jalalaqi and Jowhar; several locations across Mudug; as well as Burao, Oodweyne, Ainabo, Oog, El-Afweyn and Garadag.

As of early March, the Protection and Solutions Monitoring Network (PSMN) partners documented approximately 29,904 households (around 180,000 individuals) newly displaced due to drought impacts across multiple regions. This includes 2,404 households in Afmadow, 10,500 households across Hiraan and Middle Shabelle regions, 1,100 households in Mudug, and 6,000 households across the Togdheer, Sanaag, and Sool regions while 1,084 households have fled to Gashamo in Ethiopia where it has been informed for the humanitarian response.

Displacement is driven by livestock loss, water scarcity, and collapsed grazing resources, forcing rural households toward urban centers. Vulnerable groups—including children, women, older persons, and persons with disabilities—face heightened protection risks, with 14,700 children and 317 persons with disabilities affected.

Despite the worsening drought, humanitarian assistance remains minimal. PSMN calls on partners and authorities to urgently scale up life-saving support, protection services, and community-based interventions.

Protection Risks

Child and Family Separation: Large-scale displacement movements have heightened the risk of child and family separation. The Protection and Solutions Monitoring Network (PSMN) documented 13 cases of family separation, which were referred through protection mechanisms and successfully reunified.

Forced Displacement: As drought conditions continue to deteriorate, there is a high likelihood of additional displacement from affected rural communities toward already overstretched urban areas and informal settlements. This movement is expected to further strain limited basic services, including water, shelter, health care, and sanitation, while increasing protection risks for vulnerable groups. Women, children, older persons, and persons with disabilities may face heightened exposure to exploitation, violence, and family separation during displacement and in overcrowded settlement conditions. Without timely humanitarian assistance and resilience support, affected households may continue to adopt negative coping mechanisms as livelihoods and community support systems erode.

The ongoing drought in Somalia, compounded by related violence and persistent security concerns, continues to heighten the risk of people being forced to flee their homes. As livelihoods collapse and communities face increasing threats, many Somalis are left with little choice but to seek safety and resources elsewhere. These

pressures not only drive large-scale internal displacement but also push individuals and families to cross international borders, particularly into neighboring Ethiopia and Kenya, in search of protection, stability, and humanitarian support.

Limited Access to Resources, Services, and Humanitarian Access: Affected households report very limited access to humanitarian assistance, with many communities yet to receive any form of support. The lack of access to essential services and relief is heightening protection risks and pushing vulnerable households toward negative coping strategies.

Protection and Humanitarian Needs

 **Food Assistance:** Household food sources have been decimated by crop failure and widespread livestock losses, resulting in critical food insecurity. Widespread crops and livestock losses are pushing households into acute food insecurity.

 **Shelter:** Many displaced households are living in makeshift shelters or without adequate protection from harsh weather. Immediate provision of emergency shelters and tents is urgently required to ensure safety and dignity. Shelter solutions must be sensitive to the needs of women, children, older persons, and persons with disabilities. Strengthening community-based shelter support and access to safe sites is critical to reduce protection risks.

 **WASH:** Access to safe water and sanitation is critical in drought-affected displacement sites. Urgent water trucking, sustainable water points, emergency latrines, and hygiene kit distribution are needed to reduce health risks and prevent disease outbreaks, while ensuring safe access to minimize exposure to gender-based violence and other protection concerns.

 **Protection Services:** Immediate protection support is urgently needed for displaced families facing gender-based violence, child protection violations, psychosocial distress, and heightened risks for older persons and persons with disabilities. Priority actions include protection monitoring, confidential case management and referrals, survivor-centered GBV and child protection services, support for explosive hazard survivors (EORE, IPA), and strengthened community-based protection mechanisms to safeguard safety, dignity, and rights.

The PSMN (Protection & Solutions Monitoring Network) is a UNHCR-led project that identifies and reports on displacements, as well as the protection risks and incidents driving such population movements. On behalf of UNHCR and the Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC), 10 local partners across Somalia conduct data gathering—primarily through interviews with affected communities and key informants—and monitor displacement trends at strategic locations.
