

OVERVIEW

(June 2023) Detention is a key tool in Bulgaria's response to migration flows, and despite a decrease in detention rates between 2017 and 2020, they are now at their highest level since 2015. Asylum seekers are regularly detained, and although unaccompanied children are legally protected against detention, in reality this protection is only applied to those visibly under the age of 14. Conditions inside detention facilities remain inadequate, especially regarding hygiene, nutrition, and health care.
