

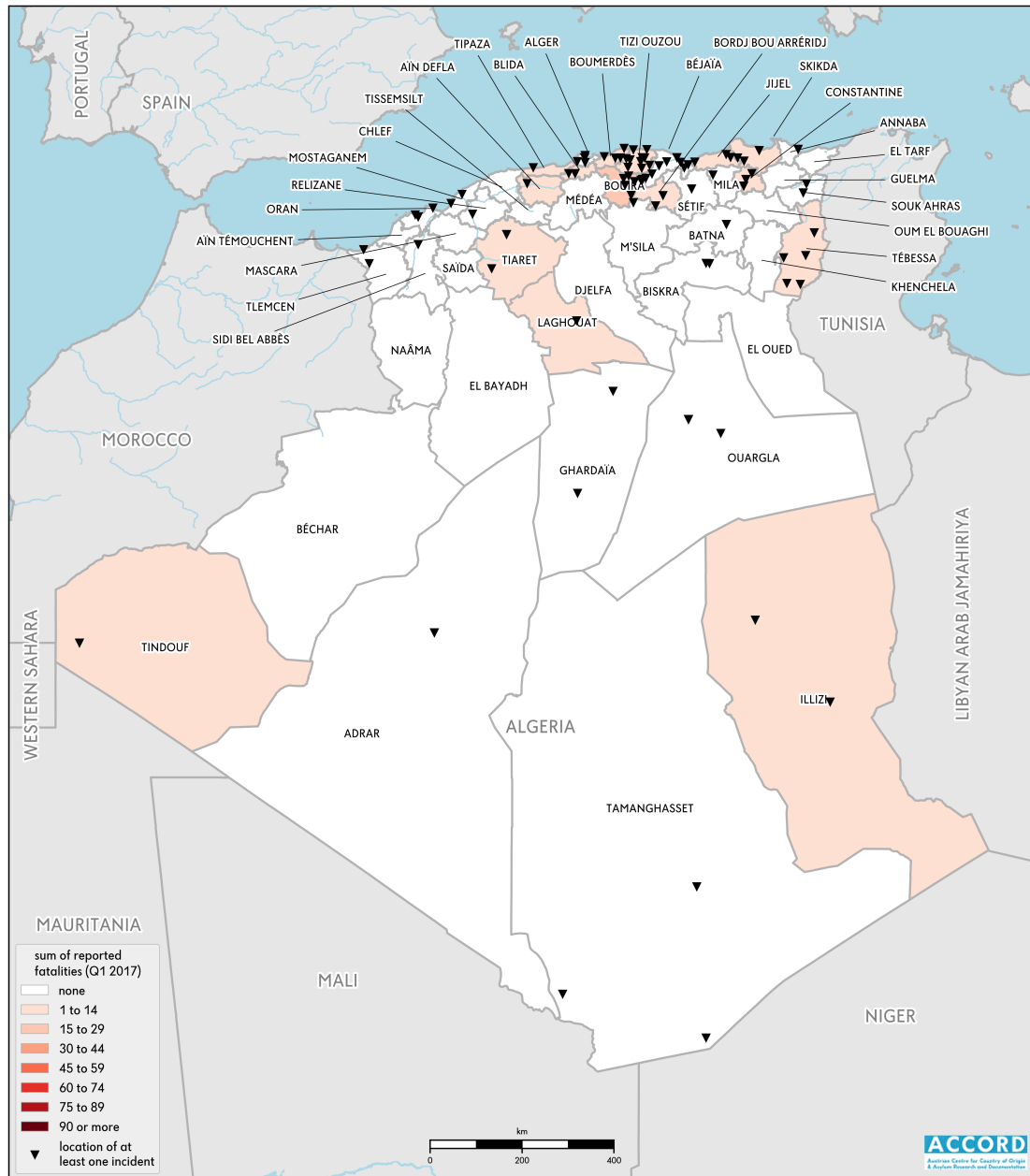

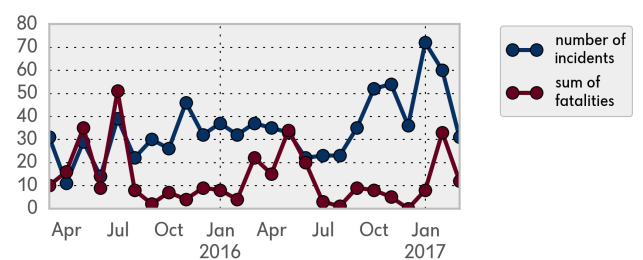

LOCALIZATION OF CONFLICT INCIDENTS

Note: The following list is an overview of the incident data included in the ACLED dataset. More details are available in the actual dataset (date, location data, event type, involved actors, information sources, etc.). In the following list, the names of event locations are taken from ACLED, while the administrative region names are taken from GADM data which serves as the basis for the map above.

In **Adrar**, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following location was affected: **Adrar**.

In **Alger**, 11 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Algiers, Bab El Oued, Baba Ali, Mahelma**.

In **Annaba**, 3 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following location was affected: **Annaba**.

In **Aïn Defla**, 1 incident killing 1 person was reported. The following location was affected: **Ain Bouyahia**.

In **Batna**, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following location was affected: **Batna**.

In **Biskra**, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Biskra, Chetma**.

In **Blida**, 5 incidents killing 1 person were reported. The following locations were affected: **Blida, Mouzaia**.

In **Bordj Bou Arréridj**, 2 incidents killing 2 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Bordj Bou Arreridj, Medjez**.

In **Bouira**, 16 incidents killing 19 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Bouira, Cheurfa, El Adjiba, Haizer, Mesdour, Oued el Berdi, Raffour**.

In **Boumerdès**, 4 incidents killing 2 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Bordj Menaiel, Boumerdes, Dellys, Naciria**.

In **Béjaïa**, 13 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Akbou, Bejaia, El Kseur, Sidi Aich, Souk el Tenine, Taskriout, Tazmalt, Tichy**.

In **Constantine**, 12 incidents killing 3 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Ali Mendjeli, Constantine, Djebel el Ouahch**.

In **Ghardaïa**, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **El Golea, Ghardaia**.

In **Illizi**, 2 incidents killing 3 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Bordj Omar Driss, Illizi**.

In **Jijel**, 4 incidents killing 5 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Beni Oudjhane, El Milia, Ziama Mansouriah**.

In **Laghouat**, 1 incident killing 2 people was reported. The following location was affected: **Laghouat**.

In **M'Sila**, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: **Beni Ilmane**.

In **Mila**, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: **Elayadi Barbes**.

In **Mostaganem**, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Hadjadj, Mostaganem**.

In **Oran**, 9 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Arzew, Mers el Kebir, Oran**.

In **Ouargla**, 14 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Hassi Messaoud, Ouargla**.

In **Relizane**, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was affected: **Relizane**.

In **Sidi Bel Abbès**, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following location was affected: **Sidi Bel Abbes**.

In **Skikda**, 5 incidents killing 2 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Ain Kechra, Oum Toub, Skikda**.

In **Souk Ahras**, 3 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Drea, Souk Ahras**.

In **Sétif**, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following location was affected: **Setif**.

In **Tamanghasset**, 3 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **In Guezzam, Oued Taoundart, Tamanrasset**.

In **Tiaret**, 5 incidents killing 1 person were reported. The following locations were affected: **Madena, Tiaret**.

In **Tindouf**, 2 incidents killing 1 person were reported. The following location was affected: **Tindouf**.

In **Tipaza**, 1 incident killing 1 person was reported. The following location was affected: **Gouraya**.

In **Tizi Ouzou**, 22 incidents killing 9 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Ain-El-Hammam, Azazga, Azeffoun, Bouzeguene, Draa-Ben-Khedda, Freha, Maatka, Saharidj, Tigzirt, Tizi Ouzou**.

In **Tlemcen**, 2 incidents killing 0 people were reported. The following locations were affected: **Ghazaouet, Maghnia**.

In **Tébessa**, 6 incidents killing 1 person were reported. The following locations were affected: **Djebel Garet Zina, Hassi El Karma, Negrine, Oglat Oulad Mahboub, Tebessa**.

METHODOLOGY

The data used in this report was collected by the Armed Conflict Location & Event Data Project (ACLED). ACLED collects data on reported conflict events in selected African and Asian countries, Algeria being among them. ACLED researchers collect event data from a variety of sources and code them by date, location, agent, and event type. For further details on ACLED and for the full data, see www.acleddata.com und [Raleigh; Linke; Hegre, and Karlsen, 2010](#).

Based on these data, the Austrian Centre for Country of Origin & Asylum Research and Documentation (ACCORD) compiles updates on conflict incidents. Geographic map data is primarily based on GADM, complemented with other sources if necessary. ACLED's location data is then used to located incidents in these maps. Incidents that could not be located are ignored. The numbers included in this overview might therefore differ from the original ACLED data.

Incidents comprise the following categories: battle, headquarters or base established, non-violent strategic activities, riots/protests, violence against civilians, non-violent transfer of territory, remote violence. For details on these categories, please see
