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Situation Update: Emergency Displacement in Northwest Syria

1-7 September 2023

Aleppo and Idlib Governorates

KEY FINDINGS

Between **1-7 September 2023**, as recalled by key informants (KIs):

- **3,767** IDP individuals arrived to assessed communities in Al Bab, A'rima, and Jarablus sub-districts in **Aleppo governorate** as reported by KIs
- **1,584** IDP individuals arrived to assessed communities in Ariha, Ehsem, Mhambal, Harim, Qourqeena, and Salqin sub-districts in **Idlib governorate** as reported by KIs
- **11,606** IDP individuals departed assessed locations in **Aleppo governorate** with the largest displacement from Ghandorah sub-district and **658** in **Idlib governorate** as reported by KIs

CONTEXT & RATIONALE

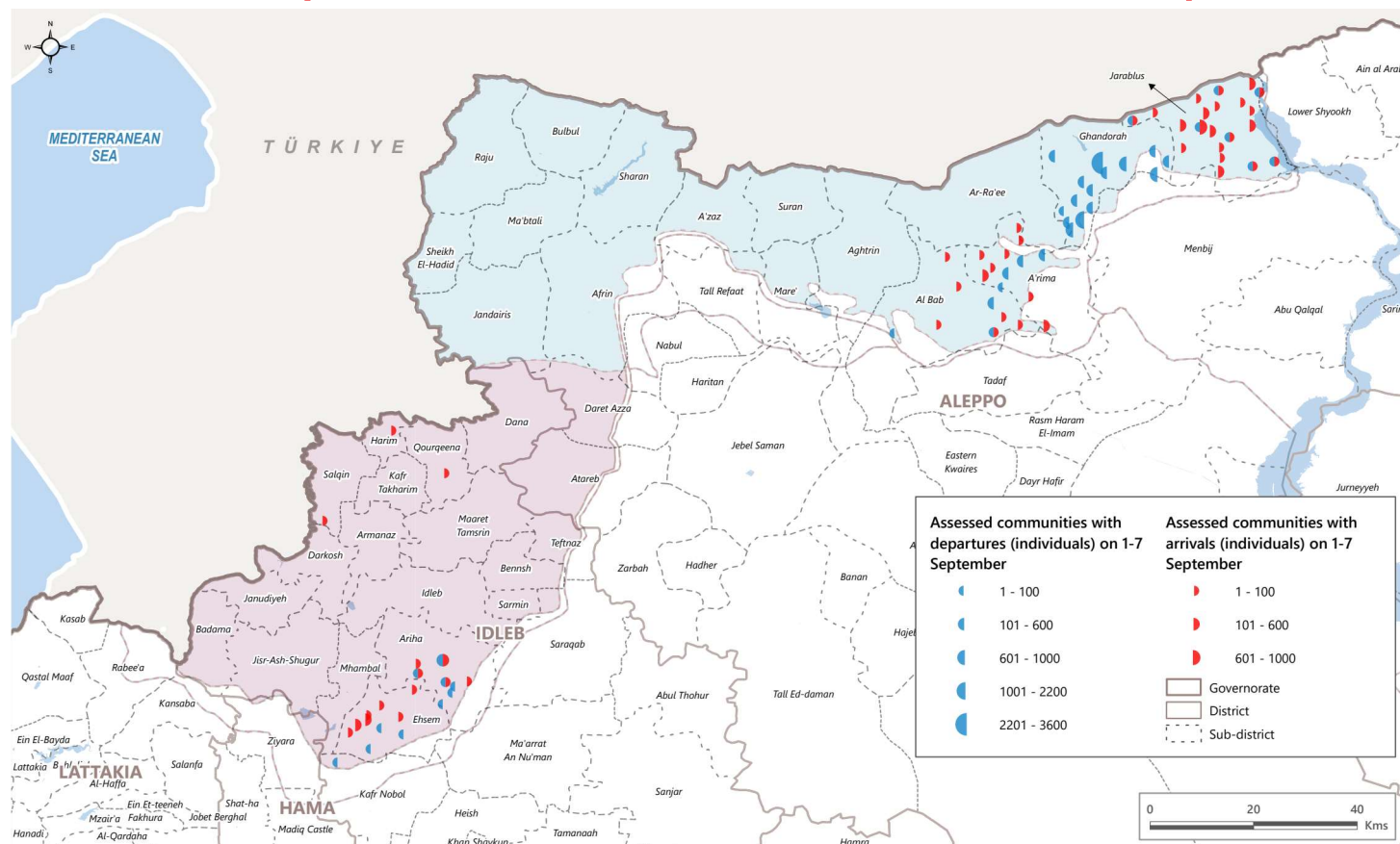
Since 1 September, increased armed hostilities in Northwest Syria has resulted in injury, death, and the significant displacement of civilians in affected communities across Northern Aleppo and Idlib governorates.¹ As of 9 September, 22 people including 11 children were injured, and 5 people were killed. As of 11 September, due to the increase in hostilities, data indicates as many as 5,300 families (estimated 26,500 individuals) displaced across Northwest Syria from 1 to 9 September.²

With the situation ongoing, this update provides displacement statistics as reported by KIs in 145 communities assessed across Northern Aleppo and Idlib governorates between 1-7 September.

5,351 # of IDP individuals arrived to assessed locations as recalled and reported by KIs

12,264 # of IDP individuals departed from assessed locations as recalled and reported by KIs

METHODOLOGY OVERVIEW

On 7 and 10 of September, REACH and a partner organization conducted 147 structured remote and face-to-face KI interviews in 145 communities, 13 sub-districts, and 6 districts in Aleppo and Idlib governorates in Northwest Syria. The data was collected using a structured tool built in Kobo. Both REACH and partner organization field teams received training on the survey tool. A purposeful sampling methodology was employed. REACH and partner enumerators reached out to sub-district level KIs to start snowballing and identifying communities where displaced people were arriving.

Thereafter, full interviews were conducted with district KIs from the identified communities in stage one and short interviews were completed for community KIs. The recall time period for KIs interviewed was the period of 1 to 7 September 2023. Following this methodology, the findings presented in this factsheet may be considered indicative.

Due to the rapid nature of data collection, it might be possible that respondents could have under or overestimated the number of arrivals and departures.
