UNHCR is the UN lead agency for humanitarian assistance in the region.

The division of responsibilities of the UN humanitarian agencies is as follows:

UNHCR

lead humanitarian agency primarily tasked with repatriation of refugees and return of internally displaced persons as well as protection and legal assistance. UNHCR cooperates with NGOs which implement reconstruction and social services programmes;

WIT

mobilization and delivery of basic food and provision of supplementary food; keeps donors and implementing partners fully informed on all aspects of the food aid process, including assessment of needs, status of food aid pledges, delivery and distribution;

WHO

primary agency for health sector, including health monitoring, nutrition evaluation, public health interventions, support to war victims, rehabilitation of health services and provision of medical equipment and supplies;

UNICEF

multi-sectoral assistance for ensuring provision of survival and development needs of women and children (in nutrition, domestic needs, health, psycho-social rehabilitation, water, sanitation, and educatio)

In addition, the EC, through the ECHO and DG-IA, supports programmes throughout the region, while several governments provide teams and second personnel to UNHCR. Many NGOs are active in the region, making a major contribution to the humanitarian assistance programme. The ICRC carries out protection activities related to detainees, missing persons, family contacts, also undertaking direct deliveries of assistance. IOM operates a family reunification programme, special medical evacuations and international transport.

The plan, endorsed by the Federation President Vladimir Soljic and Vice President Ejup Ganic, could open the way to over 100 thousand minority returns in Central Bosnia. The plan will need the support of the newly reformed joint police force, the judicial system and a flexible inter-sectoral approach assistance, with a particular emphasis on job creation. The plan's initial stage envisages cross-ethnic returns to a number of villages which are damaged but virtually uninhabited.

Good news on the return front was marred by yet another brutal murder of a Croat returnee, in the village of Turbe, in Travnik municipality (Central Bosnia Canton), the fifth such unsolved case in the last 6 months. Police investigations are being conducted by

the joint Croat/Bosniak police in Travnik and closely monitored by IPTF.

Returns have proven sensitive in Martin Brod near Drvar, with 14 Serb families returning under the procedures agreed upon with the Croat authorities. The tension finally decreased after IPTF, strengthened by an agreement from the Federation, escorted in members of a multi ethnic police force to patrol the area under its supervision.

In Mostar, an agreement on the Procedures for Registration for Return in Canton 7 has not yet been reached despite a previous commitment for their implementation from President Tudjman. UNHCR is working to bring the parties together to finalize an agreement.

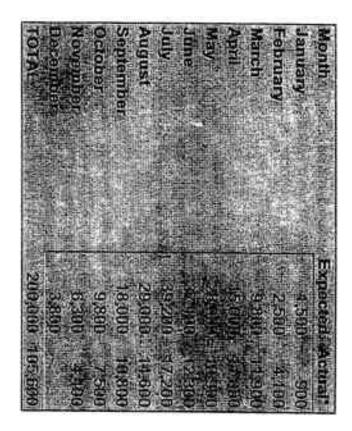

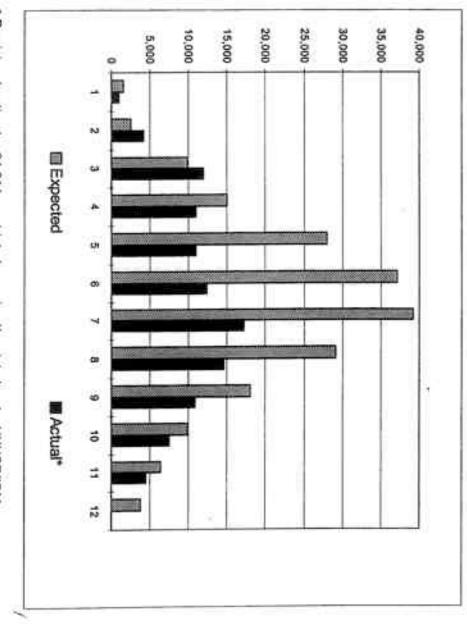

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UNHCR BUS LINES



In order to facilitate freedom of movement across the Inter Entity Boundary Line (IEBL), build confidence among the population on both sides of the IEBL and promote minority returns, UNHCR and its implementing partner the Danish Refugee Council (DRC) have established 9 bus and 3 minibus lines (for test runs) across the IEBL. In addition, UNHCR's implementing partner Bosanski Humanitarni Logisticki Servis (BHLS) has taken over the bus lines across the IEBL previously operated by DRC in the area of UNHCR's Field Office in Eastern BiH, specifically across both sides of Sarajevo.

Despite some minor incidents, the bus lines are a great success. At the beginning of November, over 460 000 passengers (44% male and 56% female) had been transported across the IEBL by the UNHCR "white buses", as they are

known. It is also an ongoing process, expanding with increasing demand: the latest bus line was established between Banja Luka and Bihac on 4 November 1997.

These bus lines have proven to be a crucial factor in building up confidence in areas where they are operational as well as a significant way to exchange information between people from both Entities or to travel to visit their friends and relatives living across the IEBL.

UNHCR bus lines continue to receive generous financial support from the European Communnity Humanitarian Office (ECHO).

Ultimately, UNHCR hopes that the bus lines will become commercialized through private local contractors.

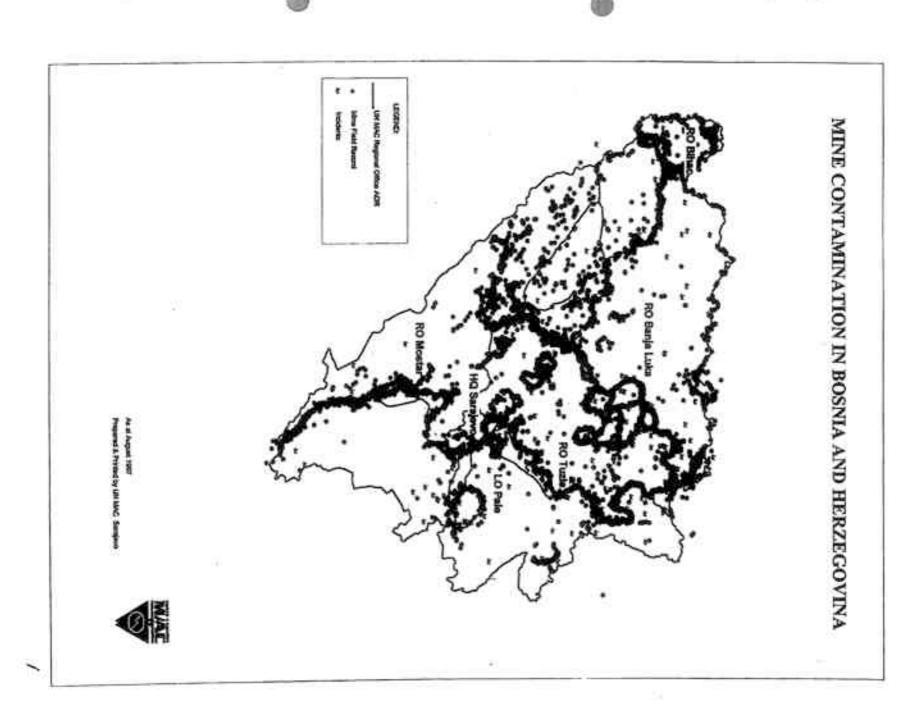

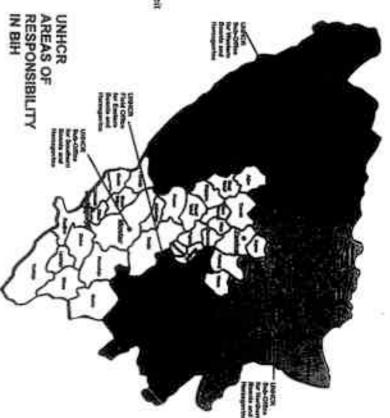
