1. Introduction

This is HRAPF's 34th monthly report on violence and other forms of human rights violations on the basis of sexual orientation and gender identity/expression since the Anti-Homosexuality Act, Cap 117 (AHA) came into force on 30th May 2023. The report discusses cases in which known or suspected LGBTQ+ persons were targeted for violence and violations purely on the basis of their SOGIE as reported to HRAPF in the month of March 2026. This report builds on the reports produced earlier for every month since the AHA came into force and therefore adds on to the data available about the enforcement of the AHA 2023 from 30th May 2023 to date.

2. Methodology

This report provides an overview of cases of violence and human rights violations on the basis of SOGIE that were reported to the HRAPF legal aid network in March 2026. Quantitative data for this report was obtained from a review of case files for data on the number of cases handled and the number of cases in which acts of violence or other human rights violations were identified. The data was then subjected to a qualitative analysis to ascertain the circumstances under which the incidents occurred, in order to ensure that only cases in which such acts were perpetrated purely or primarily on the basis of real or presumed SOGIE are included in the report. All data reported has been independently verified to ensure its accuracy.

The data presented in this report covers only cases reported through the HRAPF legal aid network. The report therefore presents a fair picture of the situation for LGBTIQ+ persons across the country as reported to HRAPF's countrywide network of community paralegals, regional legal aid centres, specialised community legal aid desks and the main legal aid clinic, although it may not be representative of all LGBTIQ+ persons' lived realities during the month, as not all cases were reported to HRAPF.

3. Nature and number of cases reported

HRAPF handled a total of 51 cases in March 2026, a slight reduction in number from the 62 cases handled in February 2026. Out of these, 15 cases involved actions that directly targeted people for negative treatment on the basis of their SOGIE, representing 29.4% of all the cases handled during the month and representing a slight increase from 14 cases of SOGIE-related violations in February 2026. The victims of these violations were 15 persons, a noticeable decline in number from 27 people affected by SOGIE-based violence and human rights violations in February 2026.

Out of the 15 cases in which individuals were targeted for detrimental treatment on the basis of their real or presumed SOGIE, 5 involved actual violence and threats of violence, 5 involved evictions for sexuality related reasons, 4 were arrests based on SOGIE, and 1 case involved other forms of violence/discrimination on the basis of real or presumed SOGIE.

3.1. Cases of violence and threats of violence

5 cases involving violence and threats of violence were reported to the HRAPF legal aid network in March 2026, affecting 5 individuals. This figure increased slightly from February 2026, in which 3 cases of violence were reported, affecting 3 persons.

a) Cases of actual violence

There were 3 cases registered in March 2026, with 2 cases from Kampala and 1 case in Wakiso. These incidents affected a total of 3 individuals.

b) Cases of threatened violence

There were 2 cases registered in March 2026, reported from Kabarole and Mbale districts. These threats of violence affected 2 individuals.

The attackers threatened to burn down the DIC and also deal with the client, who is the DIC coordinator.	1

3.2. Evictions

There were 5 cases in which individuals were evicted from their residences on the basis of their real or presumed sexuality, affecting 5 individuals. One case each was reported from the districts of Kapchorwa, Kasese, Lira, Mukono, and Wakiso. In 2 cases, the evictions

were by landlords, 2 evictions were by family members while in 1 case, the client was evicted by the landlord and also denied access to their family home. The number of evictions increased in March to 5 evictions compared to 2 cases of eviction that were received in February 2026.

3.3. Arrests

In March 2026, there were 4 cases involving arrests of suspected LGBTIQ+ persons for sexuality-related reasons. The cases were reported from Kabale (1), Luweero (1) and Wakiso (2 cases), and A total of 4 victims were involved in these cases. The charges in these cases were homosexuality in 3 cases and no charges were preferred in one case. This marks a decrease in arbitrary arrests on sexuality related charges from 6 cases involving 19 individuals in February 2026. None of the arrests during the month of March resulted in actual prosecution of the suspects.

3.4. Other forms of discrimination

In March 2026, 1 case was reported to the HRAPF legal aid network in which an individual was subjected to other forms of discrimination on the basis of their real or presumed SOGIE. The case involved denial of access to health services and discrimination due to perceived SOGIE.

4. Comparison with February 2026

There was a decrease in the number of cases involving LGBTIQ+ persons reported across HRAPF's legal aid network, with 51 cases handled in March while 62 cases were handled in February 2026. The number of cases in which individuals were targeted for violence and other violations on the basis of their SOGIE slightly increased from 14 cases affecting 27 individuals in February, representing 22.5% of all cases reported in February 2026, to 15 cases affecting 15 people (and representing 29.4% of all cases handled) in March 2026.

Cases involving arbitrary arrests of persons on sexuality-related charges decreased from 6 cases affecting 19 individuals in February 2026 to 4 cases affecting 4 individuals in March 2026; and cases of violence and threats of violence increased from 3 cases affecting 3 individuals in February 2026 to 5 cases affecting 5 individuals in March 2026. Eviction cases increased from 2 cases affecting 2 individuals in February to 5 cases affecting 5 individuals in March.

5. Comparison with March 2025

A year ago, HRAPF handled a total of 49 cases in the month of March 2025. This is 2 cases less than those handled in March 2026. Out of the 49 cases handled in March 2025, 16 cases involved actions that directly targeted people for negative treatment on the basis of their SOGIE which is one case more than the 15 handled in March 2026. The number of victims affected by these violations in the month of March 2025 were 19 compared to 15 in March 2026. Out of the 16 cases in which LGBTIQ people were specifically targeted for negative treatment during the month of March 2025, 6 cases involved actual physical violence and threats of violence being committed against the victims compared to 5 in March 2026, 5 were eviction cases which is the same as those in March 2026, while 3 cases involved arrests for sexuality related reasons which is less than the 4 in March 2026, and 2 cases involved other forms of violence and discrimination against suspected LGBTIQ+ persons, which is 1 more than the 1 case in March 2026.

Overall, the number cases handled and the cases involving violations both remained steady across the two months. In both months, the Anti-Homosexuality Act Cap 117 was already in force.

6. Comparison with March 2023 (the Pre-AHA period)

In March 2023, a total of 47 cases were handled involving LGBTIQ persons, of which 25 cases involved actions that directly targeted persons on the basis of their real or presumed SOGIE (43.2% of all cases handled). The actions in these cases affected a total of 58 people and included 18 cases of real or threatened violence, 5 eviction cases and 2 arrests on sexuality related charges. This represents a slight reduction from March 2023, at the height of the debate on the Anti-Homosexuality Bill, to March 2026, 34 months after the Act came into force.

7. The implementation of the AHA 2023 from 30th May 2023 to 31st March 2026

As the implementation of the AHA marks 34 months, a total of 2,291 cases involving LGBTIQ persons have been handled across the HRAPF legal aid network, of which 998 cases (43.5%) involved actions that specifically targeted LGBTIQ people because of their sexuality, gender identity and sex development affecting a total of 1,338 individuals. The breakdown of all the cases involving SOGIE-motivated violence and violations so far is as follows:

8. Conclusion

March 2026 marked the 34th month of the implementation of the AHA 2023. During the month, fewer arrests on sexuality-related issues were registered than in the last month, and none of the arrests resulted into prosecution. There was however a marked increase in reports of actual and threatened violence in different parts of the country, and evictions of persons by family members was also on the rise during the month. There was also a notable rise in commentary on homosexuality in media, especially following the arrest of a Tik Toker who allegedly appeared in a video engaging in sexual acts with a visibly intoxicated person - an issue which gained more traction with the involvement of the State Minister for Youth Affairs.

APPENDIX: Cases of arrests still pending before police stations and courts across the country at the end of March 2026

Currently, HRAPF is providing legal representation to a total of 6 individuals in 5 cases that are still pending before various courts across the country. In the 5 cases, 6 individuals are answering various charges, including homosexuality, promotion of homosexuality, and aggravated homosexuality in various courts of law. Of the 7 persons whose cases are pending before the courts, 5 are still on remand in the various prisons around the country while 2 were released on bail.

Update on earlier cases:

HRAPF/PA/774/25 in which the clients were accused by a friend of demanding for sex from him after they had refused to give him money and they were arrested in January 2025 was dismissed for want of prosecution on 25th March 2026 by the court.
