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Flood in Banadir Region Triggers Displacement of Over 4,000 Individuals in Dayniile District

Background

Heavy rainfall over the past two days in Banadir region has resulted in widespread flooding, particularly disproportionately affecting low-lying IDP settlements in Dayniile District. The flooding has resulted in damage to shelters and essential infrastructure, triggering new displacement movements among already vulnerable populations.

According to initial protection and solutions monitoring assessments, an estimated 678 households (approximately 4,068 individuals) have been displaced as a result of the flooding.

This includes secondary displacement, particularly affecting households previously displaced by conflict in Middle Shabelle conflicts who are now forced to move again due to climate-related shocks. Displacement patterns observed include movements from Dayniile district to IDP sites in Garasbaley district as well as intra-district relocations with Kahda districts to locations perceived as safer and less flood prone.

The floods have further compounded pre-existing protection risks faced by IDPs. Women, children, older persons and persons with disabilities (PWDs), are among the most affected, facing heightened exposure to loss of shelter and overcrowded living conditions, increased protection risks due to unsafe and unplanned relocation sites and limited access to basic services including WASH and health. Reportedly, a total of 2,450 are children under 18 years, 1,110 females and 508 males among the displaced people.



Protection Risks

Forced secondary displacement: Recently displaced households are experiencing repeated displacement, increasing exposure to protection risks and reducing coping capacity and increasing exposure to risks, particularly for women, children, older persons with disabilities, and female-headed households who face greater challenges in mobility, safety, and access to assistance.

Gender-based violence and child protection concerns: Overcrowded shelters, lack of privacy, and unsafe living conditions could increase the risk of harassment, exploitation, and other forms of GBV.

Limited access to service and insecure shelter: Newly displaced households may face barriers in accessing healthcare, clean water, education, and protection assistance.

Psychological distress: Multiple displacements, combined with inadequate shelter and uncertainty stress, anxiety, and emotional distress, while sudden movements also heighten the risks of family separation, especially for children, older persons, and persons with disabilities. Limited assistance increases stress and emotional distress among affected populations.
