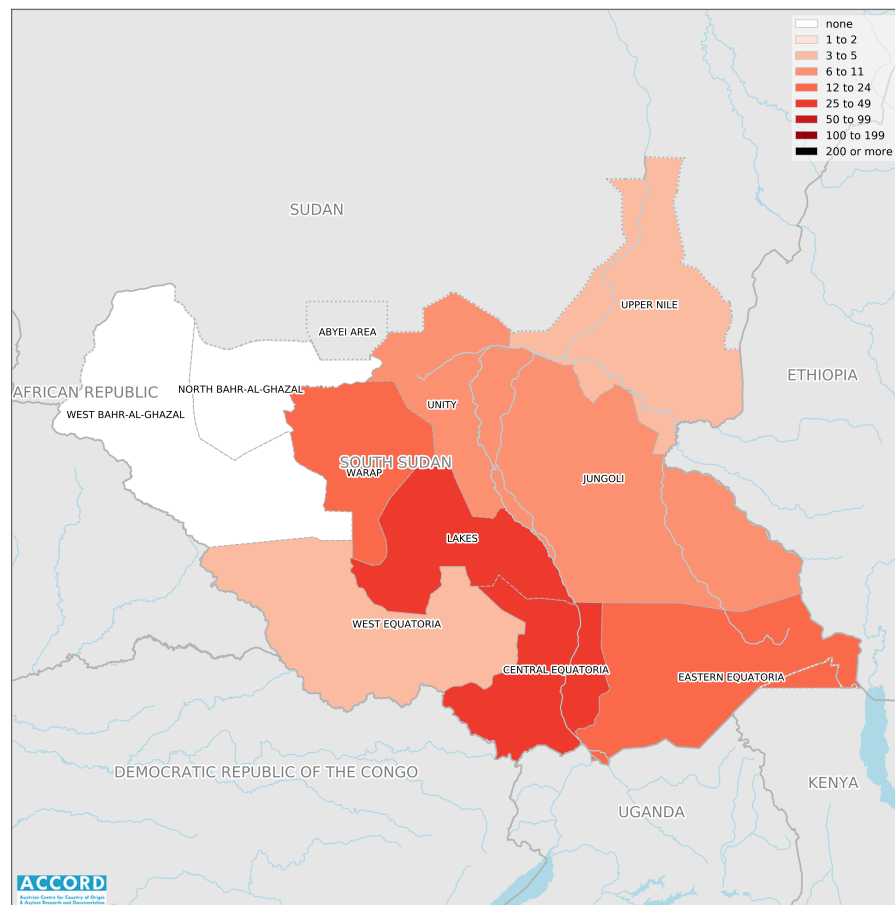

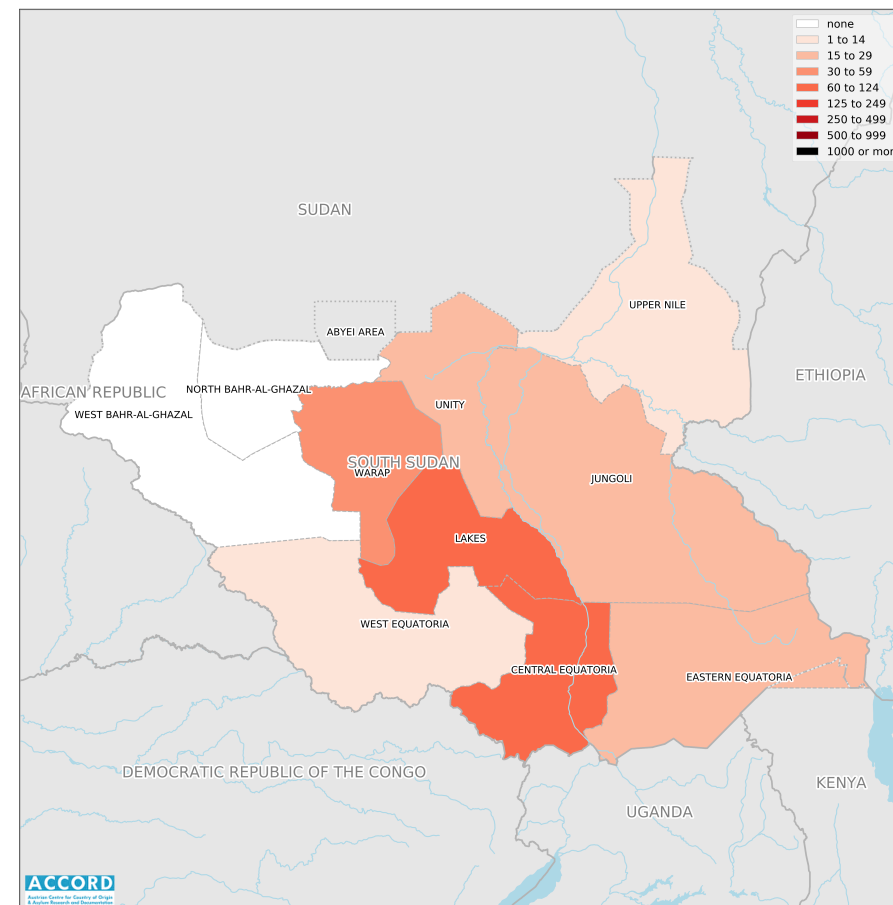

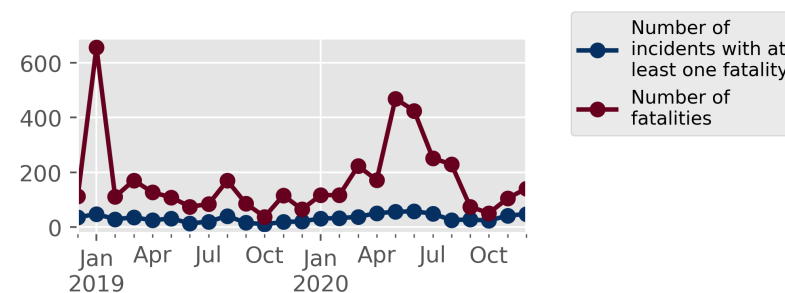

Methodology

The data used in this report was collected by the Armed Conflict Location & Event Data Project (ACLED). ACLED collects data on reported conflict events in selected African and Asian countries, South Sudan being among them. ACLED researchers collect event data from a variety of sources and code them by date, location, agent, and event type.

Most of the data collected by ACLED is gathered based on publicly available, secondary reports. It may therefore underestimate the volume of events. Fatality data particularly is vulnerable to bias and inaccurate reporting, and ACLED states to use the most conservative estimate available. ACLED uses the reports' context to estimate fatalities for events with reported fatalities for which the exact number is unknown ("10" for plural fatalities, "100" if "hundreds" are mentioned, etc.). Based on this data, the Austrian Centre for Country of Origin & Asylum Research and Documentation (ACCORD) compiles updates on conflict incidents and publishes them on ecoi.net to offer another access point to the ACLED datasets.

It is advised to employ extreme caution when using fatality numbers.

Assessments of the security situation should not be based solely on quantitative analysis of event data.

Note: Administrative divisions (based on GADM data) are reflected as of before the October 2015 reform.

Data on incidents in the Abyei area are not included in this overview.

Geographic map data is primarily based on GADM, complemented with other

sources if necessary. Incidents are mapped to GADM provinces using the provinces in ACLED data. Province names and borders may differ between ACLED and GADM. Incidents that could not be located are ignored. The numbers included in this overview might therefore differ from the original ACLED data. ACLED uses varying degrees of geographic precision for the individual incidents, depending on what level of detail is reported. Thus, towns may represent the wider region in which an incident occurred, or the provincial capital may be used if only the province is known. Erroneous location data, especially due to identical place names, cannot be fully excluded.

Incidents comprise the following categories: battles, headquarters or bases established, non-violent strategic activities, riots/protests, violence against civilians, non-violent transfer of territory, remote violence. For details on these categories, please see

Localization of conflict incidents

Note: The following list is an overview of the incident data included in the ACLED dataset. More details are available in the actual dataset (date, location data, event type, involved actors, information sources, etc.). The data's precision varies among the incidents: a town may represent a region, or the provincial capital may be used if the precise location of an incident is unknown. In the following list, the names of event locations are taken from ACLED, while the administrative region names are taken from GADM data which serves as the basis for the maps above.

In **Central Equatoria**, 60 incidents killing 93 people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: **Ajio, Duduru, Gudele, Gumbo, Jebel Lado, Joppa, Juba, Kagwada, Kapuri, Karpeto, Kenyi, Kerwa, Kit, Kuda South,**

Kworjik, Lemon Gaba, Lobonok, Loka, Loka West, Mangalla, Mangalotore, Mogiri, Munuki, Nesitu, New Site, Rombur, Sirsiri, Terekeka, Tindalo, Waraga, Wonglari.

In **Eastern Equatoria**, 24 incidents killing 19 people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: **Agoro, Calamini, Camp 15, Haforiere, Hiyala, Idolu, Idolu Bridge, Iloli, Imoruk, Kidepo, Kikilai, Kudule, Lauru, Malnyang, Nathithi, New Tirangore, Nimule, Tirangore, Torit.**

In **Jungoli**, 21 incidents killing 25 people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: **Biar, Bor, Buong, Dengjok, Dor, Jual, Khorwai, Kolanyang, Langbar, Makol Cui, New Fangak, Otallo, Pajimar, Pamaideng, Pathai, Pathat, Pibor, Raat, Werkok.**

In **Lakes**, 40 incidents killing 62 people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: **Abieichok, Adior, Agngrial, Ameth Ciek, Athion, Awerial, Ayiem, Bunagok, Citcok, Cui Adukan, Cuiabet, Cumnyiel, Dor, Gan, Kalthok, Lekakedu, Makuei, Marwal, Mayath, Mayom, Mingkaman, Pagarau, Panhom, Rumbek, Shambe, Wun Chwei, Yirol.**

In **North Bahr-al-Ghazal**, 1 incident killing 0 people was reported. The following location was among the affected: **Kiir Adem.**

In **Unity**, 14 incidents killing 21 people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: **Aogeal, Gay, Koch, Leer, Lual, Mayom, Nhialdiu, Pankuach, UNMISS Rubkona Protection of Civilians site, Wang Kei, Zoreed.**

In **Upper Nile**, 10 incidents killing 10 people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: **Jikou, Liang, Lorwiir, Malakal, Malakal UNMISS Protection of Civilians site, Niyagwado, Renk.**

In **Warap**, 18 incidents killing 57 people were reported. The following locations

were among the affected: **Abar, Abyei, Ajang, Akok, Akop, Lol-lith, Lunyaker, Madol, Tonj, Warrap Town, Wun Kote.**

In **West Equatoria**, 8 incidents killing 6 people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: **Lesi, Naandi, Nyemoul, Or, Source Yubo, Yambio.**

In **Western Bahr El Ghazal**, 3 incidents killing 4 people were reported. The following locations were among the affected: **Kuajiena, Momoi, Wau.**
